Chances of survival are improved when you know your neighbour. Why? 1. In a vast rural area emergency response may be delayed 2. Neighbours can be the first to help 3. Neighbours know where you live & what you may need



Neighbourhood Emergency Plan


1. Define your area

- What streets are you covering
- How many households
- Where are community facilities

2. Develop a team

- Recruit leaders
- Find out who has CPR or other certification
- Recruit those who are doctors, nurses & veterinarians
- Recruit members through local organization & churches






3. Scout your area

- Assess risks & their likeliness
- Neighbourhood assets: anyone or anything that is helpful in an emergency

4. Develop emergency plan

- Have a meeting area
- Know who has special needs
- Share resources like transportation, generators & food
- Put plan in writing & distribute plan to neighbourhood
- Have teams of 3-7 for specific responsibilities and a lead for each team
