Fall Preparedness

Policy and Procedure Review

Policies and procedures provide your staff, residents and families with best practice guidance and frameworks for daily operations within your organization. P&Ps are created on an as needed basis and should be reviewed annually or more frequently if best practice guidelines change.

It is important to involve the key players, for example IPAC leads, health and safety and leaderships. Using best practice and evidence based references is important to inform practice. The following references are commonly used in IPAC policies and procedures:

- Provincial/international bodies: CSA, PIDAC, PHAC, PHO, PicNet, IPAC Canada, Ministry guidance, etc.
- Colleagues
- Other organizations through networking
- IPAC Hub

Setting a schedule to review P&Ps can be very beneficial, the fall is when you want to review the following P&Ps

- Vaccination for residents, staff and visitors
- Education and training
- Outbreak response
- Screening
- Specimen collection
- PPE procurement
- Point of care risk assessment
- PPE donning and doffing
- Staff illness
- Fit Testing
- Surveillance
- Reporting

Education for Staff, Residents and Families

Regular and re-occurring education for staff, residents and families is an important component of your IPAC program within your home. Homes can develop their own in-education review, use reviews created by Public Health Ontario, or they can reach out to the Grey Bruce IPAC Hub for assistance. Education can be as simple as a one page info sheet to a more in-depth online or in-person education sessions.

Staff

- PPE donning and doffing
- Point of care risk assessments
- N95 fit testing and training
- Outbreak response what is your role in an outbreak?
- Review of symptoms

Residents

- Reminder to report an new or worsening symptoms immediately to staff
- Review of hand hygiene
- Importance of mask use during outbreaks

Families / Visitors

- Staying home when they are ill
- Outbreak response what can they expect during an outbreak? What role will they play in an outbreak?
- Review of PPE donning and doffing
- 4 Moments of Hand Hygiene

Outbreak Response

While the impacts of COVID-19 have continued to be on the forefront, we must ensure that staff and residents are also prepared for the upcoming influenza season. As you are well aware, outbreaks place a substantial burden on homes. Homes are encouraged to review and revise their outbreak readiness plans prior to the fall season. This plan will allow your home to act quickly and implement appropriate measures to limit the burden an outbreak can place on staff, residents and resident families.

Homes should consider the following when planning for the fall:

Update COVID-19 / Influenza Response Plans

Antiviral planning and preparation (influenza and COVID-19) — Antivirals are approved for use when dealing with both influenza and COVID-19. Home can be proactive by getting antiviral orders for treatment and prophylaxis of influenza. The use of COVID-19 antivirals should be discussed with the physician at the time of infection.

Cohorting – Cohorting can be use in the management of staff assignments, as well as resident placement during an outbreak. Whenever possible consider cohorting staff to specific units or floors. Reviewing all aspects of the home is key: do you have space to create a COVID ward? How and when would you consider the movement of residents to provide cohorting?

Staffing contingency plans – Staffing remains a concern across healthcare sectors. Homes must have a contingency plan to ensure shifts are covered during an outbreak. Considerations can include: agency staffing, use of staff from other outbreak homes, etc.

Personal protective equipment (PPE) procurement – Review your current PPE inventory, including expiration dates, and assess the needs of the home. Consider the amount of PPE needed during an outbreak. Homes can continue to access PPE from the provincial portal.

Review of Ministry documents – Documents and directives are forever changing so keep close tabs on the key outbreak documents

Check your kits – Ensure you have test kits on hand (respiratory and enteric kits). Please connect with your infectious disease zone member to access kits.

Vaccination

To stop the spread of influenza and COVID-19, the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care recommends immunization for health care workers, including non-clinical staff and volunteers, who have contact with residents. Influenza and COVID-19 can be very serious for older adults, as well as anyone in poor health.

Plan ahead to provide vaccines to your staff, residents and volunteers. More information on influenza vaccine to follow.

Addressing Vaccine Hesitancy

Vaccine hesitancy has been named one of the top ten global threats by the World Health Organization. Vaccine hesitancy is the reluctance or refusal to vaccinate despite the availability of vaccine. This stems, in large part, from misinformation about vaccines shared through social media platforms and the internet.

Many of the vaccine hesitancy tools you may have used for Influenza and COVID-19 immunization may also be helpful.

An IPAC lead must have the skills and knowledge of an IPAC program, IPAC core competencies, IPAC outbreak management, and awareness of Ministry directives and documents, along with the ability to translate their knowledge and engage staff, residents, volunteers and visitors within the home. IPAC training should be designed to meet the needs of the IPAC lead based on their current knowledge and skills.
